What is Person-first Language?

- Referring to individuals or groups in a way that emphasizes them as people, not by a certain status
- Increasingly important in different fields, such as medicine and criminal legal

Why is This Important?

- Helps decrease stigmatization
- Avoids labeling individuals by their temporary situation
- More empowering

Changing Our Language

Instead of: "Prisoner" "Criminal" "Felon" "Inmate"



Use:

"Resident"

"Justice-involved person"

TAKE-AWAYS

- ✓ Our words matter.
- ✓ This issue is increasingly important in many fields. Person-first language is especially important in the medical and legal systems, as clients are particularly susceptible to dehumanizing language.
- ✓ Changing how we talk about those in the criminal legal system can decrease stigma, avoid labels, and be empowering.
